Many battles were fought, won, and lost to forge our independent nation. Explore our revolutionary history and the critical engagements in Western Pennsylvania from 1754-1773.

FT NECESSITY: 1754

The battle at Fort Necessity, fought during the summer of 1754, was **THE** battle that started the French and Indian War, and was also the site of George Washington's first military engagement and only surrender.

• LUNCH – Stone House, Farmington, Pennsylvania is one of the original wayside inns along the National Road, and first opened its doors in 1822 to waggoners and travelers. Enjoy this luncheon buffet with 2 entrée choices, 3 choices of sides and 1 choice of dessert. An example buffet may include Tuscan Baked Chicken Breast, Baked Rigatoni with Sausage and Cheese, with sides of Minestrone, Buttermilk Mashed Redskin Potatoes, Iceberg Wedge Salad, and for dessert, Stone House Bread Pudding with Vanilla Sauce. Several choices are available.



A soldier from the Virginia Regiment will welcome your group and share the riveting stories of young George Washington's life on the Western frontier in 1758. You'll learn about his Friendly Fire Incident, the closest the young colonel ever came to death. See the new Washington Gallery before heading into the Fort. Your visit ends with a serving of ice cream — George Washington's favorite treat!

HANNAS' TOWN: 1773

Hanna's Town was the site of the first seat of government for Westmoreland County and hosted the first English courts west of the Allegheny Mountains, signaling settlers foothold on the Pennsylvania frontier and the push to move west. The town was an oasis for travelers, settlers, and those seeking justice and order in the often-chaotic environment of the western Pennsylvania frontier.
